It means providing access to healing and justice that doesn't cause further trauma.

It also means looking at how racism continues to manifest in our institutions and organizations, including here at the YWCA. We've been re-examining the ways that white supremacy culture shows up in our different programs, our norms, policies, and even our paperwork-- and actionable ways that we can dismantle this culture. If we're really going to end domestic and sexual violence, then this is part of the work.

Shelter and Housing Program Updates

Our essential services, including operation of our current domestic violence shelter and our housing programs for homeless families, have continued uninterrupted during the Covid crisis. New policies and safety protocols were put in place. Program staff have remained dedicated and flexible, and we will continue to evolve to meet the changing needs of our participants and community.

Today, the domestic violence shelter is housing three adults. However, there has been significant fluctuation in the number of people accessing shelter over the last few months. This may be due to the additional challenges faced by many people in abusive relationships right now, including financial instability, reduced social support, and greater uncertainty about life circumstances.

In emergency housing there are currently has 14 families. This includes 15 children, ranging in age from newborn to 14 years old. There are five families on the waiting list.
